Purpose and objectives

These guidelines provide essential information for all applicants seeking funding from the NSW Recreational Fishing Trusts in 2026 and beyond.

Background

When fishing in NSW waters, both freshwater and saltwater, recreational fishers are required to pay the NSW Recreational Fishing Fee. All revenue raised by the NSW Recreational Fishing Fee is placed into the Recreational Fishing Trusts. There are two Trusts - one for saltwater and one for freshwater. Funds from the Trusts are used to deliver a wide range of projects and programs to boost recreational fishing opportunities in NSW.

Objective

Deliver projects using funds from the Trusts to boost recreational fishing opportunities in NSW. Projects in the current funding round are required to fall within the following grant platforms:

- Fishing infrastructure and improving fishing access,
- Recreational fishing education

Goals

- Implement innovative projects to boost recreational fishing opportunities.
- Promote recreational fishing as a healthy, outdoors activity for the whole family.
- Educate fishers to fish responsibly and safely.
- Promote the sustainable growth of recreational fishing.

The program is administered by the NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development – Fisheries.

Who can assist you?

General instructions

Recreational fishing infrastructure projects

For fish cleaning stations projects, standard plans with a number of design options are available [here](#). Any lighting should be solar powered unless a power supply is readily available.

For fishing platform projects, there are no standardised plans for fishing platforms as their design is very dependent on site specific factors. A summary of design principles and guidelines for accessible recreational fishing platforms is available [here](#).

Education projects

Applicants should take account of existing Recreational Fishing Trust funded and/or DPIRD Fisheries educational resources such as fisheries education materials and programs so as to build on and not duplicate fisheries education efforts, prior to submitting an application for funding.

Application process

Applicants are required to apply using an online application form (see 'How to apply' section below).

Eligibility criteria

All of the following eligibility criteria must be addressed when applying for funding

- Have an Australian Business Number (ABN). Note: Applicants without an ABN may be able to submit a Statement by supplier form in accordance with the law. However, applicants with an intent to submit a future Statement by supplier form must get approval from DPIRD prior to an application being submitted.
- Be a legal entity such as one of the following:
 - a company incorporated in Australia
 - an incorporated association (including clubs) or co-operative
 - a partnership
 - a sole trader
 - a local council or joint organisation of councils
 - an educational institution or organisation
 - a Government agency

- Hold or commit to obtaining public liability insurance of not less than \$10 million per occurrence or hold equivalent or better self-insurance to the satisfaction of the Department, prior to executing a funding deed with the Department
- Only fishing access and facilities or fishing education related projects are eligible for funding.

Assessment criteria

All of the following assessment criteria must be addressed when applying for funding

General assessment criteria

The following assessment criteria apply to all applications:

- Funding applications **must relate to the improvement of recreational fishing** and provide a high level of recreational fishing benefit (including a high extent of benefit to recreational fishers against other user groups).
- Projects must include measures to enhance, maintain or protect recreational fishing (as outlined in Sections 234(2a) and 235(2a) of the *Fisheries Management Act 1994*).
- Applications must be completed in full, with sufficient detail to enable a sound assessment.
- Relative team expertise to deliver the project including adequate track record of past project delivery (where relevant).
- Project methodology must be technically sound and utilise best practice.
- Applications must have an accurate, cost effective budget which shows value for money. Contributing funding or 'in-kind' contributions by the applicant and other project partners should be included in the budget, where relevant.
- Applications must show stakeholder support for the project (where relevant).
- Applications must show evidence of or commitment to obtain landowner consent (where relevant).
- Project activities and outputs should not be of a commercial nature (including running of organisations/clubs), or materials developed for a primarily commercial purpose and must be made available free to the public.
- Projects must provide unimpeded general public access and should not be on private land (where relevant) or land with no free public access.
- Contingency funding components of applications will not be supported for funding.
- Applications must not include costs for purchase of vehicles or vessels for recreational or commercial purposes.
- Where other suitable funding sources are available, applications must outline how these sources have been investigated and deemed to be unsuitable (where relevant) including Boating Now Program and Aboriginal Fishing Trust Fund.

Platform specific assessment criteria

Recreational Fishing Infrastructure and Access

- Project activities must not include building club premises or improving club facilities that are only available to organisation/club members.
- Project activities must not include dredging activities (this is usually the responsibility of local authorities).
- Applications must include a detailed description or design drawings of the infrastructure to be delivered, including materials to be used and the dimensions of proposed infrastructure.
- Projects should not include construction of general public amenities such as toilet blocks etc. (unless direct relevance to recreational fishing can be clearly demonstrated).
However, general public amenities may be an important part of an overall project and could be included as part of the applicant's contribution to the project. For example, a local land manager might apply for funding for a fishing platform and their contribution to the project could be to fund the adjoining car parking.
- Infrastructure should be accessible (where relevant).

Recreational Fishing Education

- Projects must have measurable and direct benefits to recreational fishing.
- Project activities must not include fishing competitions or tournaments.
- Applications must demonstrate suitable recreational fishing expertise within the project team to deliver the project.

Examples of projects funded

Over the years, the Trusts have provided funding for a wide range of projects, which have been implemented by various external organisations and DPIRD. Comprehensive angler surveys of the Recreational Fishing Trusts continue to show widespread support for the current range of programs that receive funding from the Trusts. Examples of the types of projects eligible in this funding round are provided below.

Platform	Project examples
Fishing access and facilities	Protection of fishing access, providing more fishing locations Fishing amenities such as fishing platforms, fish cleaning tables, kayak launching platforms, fishing access tracks, fishing safety infrastructure & other angler facilities
Recreational fishing education	Fishing workshops and events, schools education, providing fishing information to fishers

Some tips on ways to improve and maximise the benefit of a project:

- Infrastructure projects are usually reviewed in terms of what is the level of the requested funding in relation to the extent the infrastructure benefits recreational fishers. So key things to consider for a fish cleaning table would be how many taps does the table have, or how wide is the fishing platform or how many fishers can use it at the same time?
- Education projects are often statewide or regional, benefitting many people, but even if a project is very small scale and localised, it may have statewide benefit if it is run as a pilot project with the results shared through wider networks.
- Investigate all other potential sources of funding that could be relevant to the project. Provide any evidence of unsuccessful attempts to gain funding from other sources.
- Quotes and estimates for project items should be sought to obtain best value for money. When developing the project costings, any quotes/estimates should be attached to the project application to assist in the assessment of the project's value for money. Project budgets must not include contingency funding.

Is matching funding a requirement?

Matching funding is not a requirement, however, other contributions towards the project will improve the value for money of the project. Include details of other contributions to the project including any voluntary labour and project management time as an 'in-kind' contribution (this includes hands on volunteer work, project management, administration, reporting, donations etc).

Budget

In-kind contributions

Please ensure all aspects of the project are identified and costed in the budget table. This includes voluntary labour, donations of time or specialist expertise, project management and administration time, donation of plant and equipment to the project, the value of discounted rates given to the project, etc. All of these 'in-kind' contributions to projects should be costed. These contributions, when realistically costed, add value to the project and improve the project's overall value for money.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All applicants are required to quote GST inclusive costings on all applicable items in the application budget table, regardless of whether applicants are registered for GST or not.

Grants are assessable income for taxation purposes, unless exempted by taxation law. Grant recipients should seek independent professional advice about taxation obligations or seek assistance from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). The NSW Government does not provide advice on individual taxation circumstances.

If you are registered for GST, the delivery of your project (with grant funds) may be treated as a taxable supply under GST law. This means you may need to add GST on top of the total approved grant amount when invoicing DPIRD and you are responsible for remitting this GST to the ATO in

your business activity statements (BAS). You will be required to give the Department a tax invoice for the grant funds.

The items in your budget table may include purchases for goods or services from other businesses, where GST is already included in the price. However, please note GST applied on the grant (if applicable) for delivery of the project is treated separately from the GST already included in your project budget for goods and services expenses.

How to apply

Applicants are required to complete the online application form, which can be accessed via the NSW grant finder webpage [here](#). The 'Apply now' button will re-direct you to the SmartyGrants platform where you will be required to create a log in with a username and password.

Only information which is considered essential for assessment should be submitted as attachments with your application. Please do not submit web links, videos or excessive pages of attachments (e.g. detailed strategic reports).

When to apply

Applicants must submit their applications by the closing date and time listed in the **Grant Program Details**.

The Department retains discretion to extend the closing date and time, and to accept late applications in extenuating circumstances.

Applicants cannot amend applications (including providing letters of support) after the closing date and time.

Who can assist you?

Assistance can be provided to discuss your proposal and to ensure applications are consistent with the eligibility and assessment criteria.

False & misleading information

Applicants must not include false or misleading information in their applications. If an application contains false or misleading information, the Department may deal with the application as the

Department determines in the circumstances and may, for example, determine that the application is ineligible.

Conflicts of interest

There may be a conflict of interest, or perceived conflict of interest, if NSW DPIRD staff, any member of a committee or advisor and/or you or any of your project team personnel, including sub-contractors:

- have a professional, commercial or personal relationship with a party who can influence the application selection process, such as a NSW Government officer or member of the grant program assessment panel
- have a relationship with or interest in, an organisation, which is likely to interfere with or restrict your project team from carrying out the proposed activities fairly and independently, or
- have a relationship with, or interest in, an organisation from which they will receive personal gain because the organisation receives a grant under the grant program / grant opportunity.

As part of your application, you will be asked to declare any perceived or existing conflicts of interests or that, to the best of your knowledge, there are no conflicts of interest. If you later identify an actual, apparent, or perceived conflict of interest, you must inform the NSW DPIRD Recreational Fishing Trust Grants Management Team in writing immediately.

After submitting application

Applicants will receive a notification of receipt.

The Department may contact applicants to verify information or seek further information.

Assessment of grant applications

Determining which applications are successful involves these stages:

- Eligibility check
- Assessment
- Decision-making

Staff from DPIRD will initially assess the applications against the eligibility criteria. Applications that have met the eligibility criteria will progress to the assessment stage.

Assessments will be performed against the Program assessment criteria on freshwater and saltwater based applications, respectively. Applications may be assessed against multiple platform specific assessment criteria where there is deemed to be an overlap in project activities across grant platforms. Applications will be assessed by a panel of recreational fishing experts. Assessment recommendations will be provided to the Minister for Agriculture.

The Minister for Agriculture in their role as Decision Maker will make the final decision on applications suitable for funding. DPIRD will send successful applicants a letter of offer for funding.

Successful applicants will be required to:

1. enter into a Recreational Fishing Trusts Funding Deed. Please contact DPIRD if you would like to view the funding deed content prior to preparing your application.
2. keep funding decisions and assessment outcomes confidential if requested by DPIRD until announced by the NSW Government (for both successful and unsuccessful outcomes)
3. submit written reports on completed milestones as agreed to in the Funding Deed and submit invoices as a condition of receiving funding instalments
4. submit a final project and financial report on the project to DPIRD for evaluation within 60 days of completing the project
5. acknowledge the Recreational Fishing Trusts in project publications and signage
6. if a project is completed and there are unspent funds remaining from the grant allocation, the Department may require the grant recipient to return the unspent funds. Alternatively, the grant recipient may request to use the unspent funds on extending the scope of the project if the request aligns with the objectives of the Program.

All reporting must be uploaded via online submission forms accessed through **SmartyGrants, using the applicant's original login details**. The forms will include a file upload function for each required file (such as each milestone report and summary of expenses upon project completion).
